
West Puslinch Soirée February 3rd 1868.

The soirée of the West Puslinch Presbyterian Congregation was held in the Church on Thursday evening last, and was eminently successful. The people began to assemble about 7 o' clock, and before 8, the Church was filled. The Reverend Messrs. McLean, Pastor of the Congregation, and Davidson, Porteous, and McDonald, as well as Mr. Kenneth McKenzie, occupied the platform. After grace had been said by Reverend Mr. Porteous, and the 100th Psalm sung by the Choir, under the leadership of Mr. Housie, the ladies served an excellent supply of refreshments.

The intellectual part of the entertainment began by the Chairman introducing the Reverend Mr. Porteous, who gave an excellent address on the prosperity of the Church. The Reverend Mr. Davidson gave a very interesting account of a trip to and from Quebec, and Mr. Kenneth McKenzie followed with an exceedingly instructive sketch of his travels in the Red River Settlement. The Reverend Mr. McDonald, of Morriston, delivered a spirited address referring to the inestimable privilege, which as Christians, we enjoy, and earnestly strove to inculcate the necessity of giving a closer attention to all the duties required of us by God. The Chairman, Reverend Mr. McLean, made a few appropriate remarks, expressing his gratification at the large audience and the satisfactory manner in which the soirée passed off. The proceeds amounted to \$68 and will be expended in defraying expenses connected with the Church.

Torrance and Wardrope, of Guelph, Mason, of Galt, A. McKay, D.D., of East Puslinch, McPherson, of Killean, and the Pastor of the congregation. Music will be furnished by the choir. Tea served at half past seven.

Social in Crieff February 9th 1876.

Last Tuesday evening a very successful tea meeting was held in connection with the West Puslinch Presbyterian Church, at Crieff. An excellent tea was provided by the ladies, and after the large number of persons present had satisfied themselves to their heart's content, there was still enough left to have sufficed many more. This part of the programme having been disposed of, the intellectual part of the evening's entertainment was entered upon.

Reverend Mr. McDiarmid occupied the chair and discharged the duties thereof with his usual ability. Excellent and interesting addresses were given by Reverend Messrs. Torrance and Wardrope, of Guelph, and by the Reverend Dr. McKay, of East Puslinch Church. The proceedings of the evening were very much enhanced by the excellent rendering of several choice pieces of music by the Norfolk Street Methodist Church choir, of this Town. The tea meeting was, on the whole, a decided success, the receipts amounting to \$50. A large number from Guelph were present, and all enjoyed themselves well. We understand that it is the intention of the congregation of West Puslinch Church to build a new church at no distant day.

Crieff Items August 21st 1878.

Harvesting in this neighbourhood is very nearly finished, and now that threshing has commenced, the crop proves to be a good yield. Wheat, especially the spring crops, is, perhaps, not up to the average. Help has been rather scarce for a few weeks during the busiest time, but the press is now over.

Reverend Mr. McDiarmid, pastor of West Puslinch Church, is now enjoying a few weeks recreation in the Lower Provinces, the pulpit being filled by the appointment of neighbouring ministers. Reverend Mr. Robertson, of Strabane, preached on the 4th, and Mr. Bickle, theological student, on the following Sabbath, while Reverend Mr. Thyne, of Kirkwall, was expected to preach on the 18th.

The Sons of Temperance Lodge in the village is in a prosperous condition, and adding to their number, by an initiation, at intervals. All success attend them.

The Literary Club meets in Wm. MacDonald's boot and shoe store, where various subjects are discussed in an interesting manner. Historical events and geographical explorations occupy a prominent position among the matters taken into consideration.

The village is in a state of "ennui", but when the pressure of work incidental to the season relaxes, we may expect more enlivening times.

If some favourite of the muses could manage to pay a visit to many parts of Puslinch, especially the southern part, a fountain of inspiration would be open to him, from which, any number of figures of speech, metaphors, similes, of "hope soaring on her airy pinions", et cetera, et cetera, could be drawn, though by some ruralists, the matter is considered differently. This valuable poetical fountain is in the shape of large quantities of thistle down flying about, and denotes culpable negligence on the part of the authorities for allowing such to be the case. Although there is a very good law, intended to prevent the spread, and, if possible, to exterminate the pest, through the carelessness of those in authority, it remains virtually a dead letter. A short time ago, a number of parties in the neighbouring township of Beverly contributed their mite to the credit of the township treasury for the privilege of neglecting to cut their thistles before growing to seed. Some action on the part of the township Council is required to bring those manifesting such open disregard of the law to a due sense of their duty. The annoyance is extreme to those who endeavour to free their farms from the nuisance, and in spite of all their labour, have the seed blown on to their land, there to grow on the first favourable opportunity.

Death of an Old Settler in Puslinch October 23rd 1878.

Puslinch has lost another old settler in the death of Angus McPherson, father of Donald McPherson, who passed away on the 20th inst., at the ripe old age of ninety years. The deceased was a native of Badenoch, Inverness-shire, Scotland. He immigrated to Canada in the year 1844 and settled in Puslinch, residing on the farm that he first occupied till his death. He was an elder in the West Puslinch Presbyterian Church ever since he came to the township and was highly esteemed by all who knew him, not only for his consistent Christian life but also for his many other excellent qualities as a friend and a neighbour.

Tea Meeting January 20th 1879.

On Friday evening, the 7th of February, a tea meeting will be held in the Presbyterian Church, Crieff. After tea has been served, addresses are expected to be delivered by Reverend John Laing, of Dundas, Reverend John McKay, Reverend Mr. Thyne, Mr. D. Guthrie, M.P., and the Pastor of the Church, and others. An excellent choir will furnish music during the evening.

Fire in Crieff September 2nd 1879.

On Tuesday last, an ex-hotel, occupied by Messrs. Kereher and Fitzgerald and owned by Reeve Leslie, was discovered to be on fire. Nothing could be done to stay the flames, and before the fire spent itself for want of fuel, the outbuildings, the temperance hall, and a stone dwelling house owned by Mr. Wm. McDonald, shoemaker. Although the fire burned with great fury, considerable furniture et cetera were saved. Mr. Leslie had his place insured for \$500 in the Wellington Mutual. The loss is about \$2500.

Local News September 9th 1879.

At the late fire at Crieff, the residence of Mr. C. Moffat was saved with great difficulty. The flowers inside the windows were destroyed by the intense heat and while Mr. Moffatt was working at the fire he had his whiskers singed by the heat.

Tea Meeting in Puslinch January 13th 1880.

The tea meeting in the West Puslinch Presbyterian Church on the 7th of January was a success, considering the unfavourable state of the weather. The church, although not crowded
was well filled. Reverend Alexander McKay, D.D., was appointed chairman. Mr. Laing, of
Dundas, opened by p Afterwards, the choir sang part of the Psalm. Tea was then served, which was excellent, as also, the cakes. The Mr. Robertson, of Strabane, gave an instructive and humorous address. Mr. Laing, of Dundas, read a Scriptural, "The
Betrayal of Christ by Judas". After singing by the choir, Mr. Laing was again called on, when he gave a short address. The music was furnished by the choir from the congregation, under the management of Mr. Wm. McCormick, their precentor. Miss Cossitt, of Guelph, presided at the organ. The usual votes of thanks were carried at the close, with a special vote of thanks to Mr. John Mo, of Guelph, for the use of an organ were collected at the door.

West Puslinch Presbyterian Church April 26th 1880.

The Reverend Dr. McKay moderated in a call to a minister at West Puslinch on the 20th, which came out in favour of Reverend Evan McAuley, B.A., late of Mono and Caledon. The salary promised is \$600, with manse and five acres of glebe.

On Friday evening, January 11th, a soirée will be held in Knox Church, Crieff. Arrangements for a successful soirée are being made and all who attend may rely on spending a pleasant evening, good music, good speaking, and the tea excellent.

Soirée at Crieff

February 25th 1885.

A soirée will be held in Knox Church, Crieff, on Friday evening, March 6th. Able speakers from Galt and Guelph will be present. Good music. This soirée promises to be a most enjoyable affair.

Social at Killean April 27th 1885.

The annual social in connection with the West Puslinch Presbyterian Church, of Puslinch, was held at Killean Schoolhouse on Friday evening last. Notwithstanding the severity of the night, a very great gathering enjoyed itself during the evening. The meeting was organized by the appointment of Mr. Duncan Ferguson as Chairman, and after the playing of a martial strain from the bagpipes of Mr. McLellan, the Killean piper, the entertainment was opened by very interesting speeches from Messrs. Thos. Cowan, of Galt, Dickie and Cunningham, of Hespeler, Gilchrist, of Killean, and Archibald Marshall, of Morriston. These gentlemen acquitted themselves with great satisfaction to the audience. The Hespeler choir, with its elegant organ, at intervals, contributed greatly to the enjoyment of the evening. The local and vocal young ladies, Misses Gilchrist, Bond, Scott, and McCormick, along with Messrs. Valick and Scott, from Morriston, made the meeting a very pleasant night indeed. Killean has ever been famous for the culinary supplies furnished by its lady contributors, and this occasion was no exception.

Entertainment at Crieff February 6th 1888.

A very interesting and successful entertainment, of a musical and literary character, was given in the Crieff Schoolhouse on the evening of Thursday, the 2nd instant. The building was crowded to the door. The chair was taken shortly after eight o' clock by Principal McCormick, of the Guelph Business College, who performed the duties of chairman in a pleasing and able manner.

Mr. R. Brydon, of Guelph, rendered three solos in splendid style, which were received with enthusiasm. Two solos were given by Mr. C. Strachan, of Guelph, which were also well received. Mr. W. R. Holmes, of Guelph, acted as accompanist in his usual efficient style. Two choruses given by Messrs. Brydon, Strachan, and Holmes, and one by the Valens Choir, of Beverly, were also well received.

A very interesting poetic composition was read by Mr. Ramsey, a Canadian poet, who is destined yet to rank high among writers of verse. Mr. Ramsey also gave a short address on the subject of poetry, which sparkled with keen wit and abounded in the expression of lofty sentiment. His eulogy of Burns was loudly applauded. A reading from Ramsey's poems by Dr. Cormack, of Morriston, was thoroughly enjoyed.

Miss Cameron, of Lucknow, Mr. Pepper and the Messrs. Brown, of Morriston, contributed very acceptably to the musical part of the programme. Mr. McDonald, of Morriston, gave two excellent readings. A recitation by Master Willie Mills, of Carlisle, N.Y., was an interesting and clever effort. A duet by Messrs. Brydon and Strachan, and the singing of the National Anthem, in which the audience loyally joined, brought a most enjoyable and successful entertainment to a close.

The Guelph contingent, the poet Ramsey, Dr. Cormack, and others were then driven to the residence of Mr. Hugh McDiarmid, where they were most hospitably entertained by the host, his lady, and friends. The financial result shows a handsome balance on the right side, which is to be devoted to the improvement of the school library.

February 27th 1888.

A tea meeting will be held in the Presbyterian Church, Crieff, on the evening of Tuesday, March 6th. Several talented gentlemen from Guelph, and other places, and also the choir of St. Andrew's Church, Guelph, have been engaged so that the entertainment promises to be an excellent one.

School Examination at Crieff April 2nd 1888.

A very successful examination was held in the Crieff school on Monday March 26th. Notwithstanding the heavy rain which fell, about fifty visitors, among whom were several from neighbouring sections, assembled at the school house and were apparently well pleased with the day's proceedings. West Puslinch Church Celebrates Centenary June 26th 1940.

The one hundredth anniversary of religious life in Knox Church, West Puslinch, was marked recently, when upwards of a thousand persons gathered to celebrate the establishing of religious worship this community. A perfect June day made it much more enjoyable for the large crowd gathered in the church and also for those who received the message by means of a loudspeaker system.

The church was decorated with flowers and evergreens, amongst them being a beautiful bouquet of red roses, sent by Mrs. Catherine Hurton, of Carman, Manitoba, in memory of her father and mother, the late Mr. and Mrs. Munroe, who had been members of the church.

At the morning service, Reverend C. A. Mullin, B.A., of West Flamboro, was the special speaker, assisted by Reverend J. L. Burgess, pastor of Knox Church. The choir, under the leadership of Mr. Jas. Porteous, sang "Thine, Oh Lord, is the Greatness", by Kent, and "What Are These?", by Stainer. Mrs. Reid, of Guelph, was soloist.

At the evening service, Reverend J. D. Smart, P.H.D., of Knox Church, Galt, was guest speaker, assisted by Reverend Frank Lawson, of Nassagaweya, and Reverend J. L. Burgess. The "New Hope Quartette", of Hespeler, assisted the choir at the evening service. The choir sang "The Lord is My Shepherd" and "Abide With Me".

Greetings were read by the minister, Reverend J. L. Burgess, from Reverend Dr. Wm. Kannawin, of Toronto, Reverend Samuel Lawrence, of Whitby, Mr. H. B. Kerracher, of Verona, Pennsylvania, Mrs. Fingland, of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Mrs. Ida McAllister, of Vancouver, B.C., Mr. and Mrs. Alex Cowen, of B.C., Mr. and Mrs. James Cowen, of Seattle, Washington, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Cowen, of Vancouver, B.C., and Mr. and Mrs. Hug McAninch, of Seattle, Washington.

Reverend Mr. Lawson brought greetings from Nassagaweya Presbyterian Church and from Guelph Presbytery, and Dr. Smart, from Knox's Church, Galt.

The history of west Puslinch congregation begins with Mr. Neil McPhatter, who has many descendants in this district and who was largely responsible for the erection of the first church on Lot 15, Concession 1, of Puslinch.

Reverend Wm. Meldrum, father of Mr. George Meldrum, of Guelph, was the first minister of West Puslinch, 1840-1856. Reverend John Bayne, D.D., of Knox Church, Galt, took an active interest in the congregation and was able to secure the services of Reverend Andrew Maclean, graduate of Edinburgh University, Scotland, who was pioneer minister of West Puslinch from 1857-1873. Colonel John Bayne Maclean, who has restored the old manse and surroundings at Crieff, is a son.

After the death of Reverend Andrew Maclean, the following ministers have had charge in this congregation: Reverend Neil McDiarmid 1875-1879, Reverend Evan MacCauley 1880-1888, Reverend William Robertson 1890-1906, Reverend Samuel Lawrence 1907-1919, Reverend Stuart Woods 1919-1925, Reverend Peter Mathieson 1925-1935, and the present minister, Reverend J. L. Burgess, who took over the charge on August 12th 1936.

Plane Crash at Crieff January 7th 1943.

Three airmen died at about 2:30 yesterday afternoon when a twin-motored Avro-Anson from No. 16 Service Flying Training School, at Hagersville, ploughed into a field on a farm occupied by C. W. Maltby, two miles west of Puslinch Station.

One of the airmen has been identified as PO. John Caskie, 23, of Hamilton, a pilot instructor at the Hagersville station. He was a bridegroom for six months. A second airman was LAC. S. R. Burton, of Hammond, Indiana. The name of the third man was not available this morning, as the Hagersville school had not yet received notification that his next of kin had learned of his death.

With wreckage strewn over an area of at least 150 yards, the scene appeared as if a tremendous explosion had taken place. A piece of the fuselage was visible at the top of a tree 400 yards away from where the plane hit the ground.

Most of the debris littered the snow for a distance of about 25 yards from where the craft gouged out a path 10 feet wide in the frozen ground. Chunks of earth were blasted loose as if by dynamite.

Part of one of the engines was mingled with the wreckage on the other side of a fence from where the plane first hit, and not far away lay the bodies of the three airmen.

The snow-burdened fields prevented vehicles from reaching the scene. A sleigh belonging to a local farmer was called into service to transport the bodies of the airmen to a waiting R.C.A.F. ambulance. Coroner Dr. T. R. Pickard and Provincial Constables E. A. Webb and P. P. Seibert had been summoned shortly after the tragedy occurred.

William Huether said that he was a mile and a half away when he first saw the Avro-Anson. It was up quite a height, he told the R.C.A.F. officers, then came straight down at terrific speed.

Standing outside his home, within 300 yards of where the plane crashed, Charles Maltby was the first on the scene after the plane had nose-dived to the ground. Finding that all three occupants of the machine were dead, Mr. Maltby returned to his home to summon aid, and was later joined by Harold Kearns, Dan McDonald, James McPherson, and James McDonald, all neighbours.

"When I first noticed the plane flying from the southwest, the motors appeared to be running perfectly," Mr. Maltby told the Guelph Mercury newspaper. "When I saw it descending, I thought that it was about to make a loop, but it only seemed a matter of seconds when it hit the ground and seemed to fly all to pieces. There was a terrific impact as it struck the surface," he said.

As he raced to the spot where the plane had crashed, Mr. Maltby noticed a small fire in a portion of the scattered debris, but this quickly snuffed itself out in the deep snow. He did not hear any explosion as the craft made its fatal plunge.

The farm on which the crash occurred is owned by Louis J. Jochimeck, of Guelph, and occupied by Mr. Maltby. It is situated about two miles west of Puslinch Station and only a short distance from Crieff.

The bodies of the three airmen were conveyed to No. 4 Wireless School, at the O.A.C., and later taken to No. 16 Service Flying Training School, at Hagersville. Officers from the local air school, who were on the scene after the crash, made a preliminary investigation and communicated with officials at Hagersville when it had been determined that the plane belonged to that training centre.

Reverend T. G. M. Bryan Inducted in Duties of Puslinch Charges April 1st 1943.

McPherson, and J. D. Porteous. Wilfred Roszell and James McDonald were re-elected Treasurers, and Donald A. Stewart and Angus Smith were appointed auditors.

Reports were presented showing a balance of \$120 in the general fund and a total of \$3900 raised for all purposes, of which, \$1262 was for congregational purposes and \$2838 for missionary purposes. The latter was for all purposes, of which, \$2650 was for congregational purposes, divided as follows, Presbyterian Advance — \$1628, Mission budget — \$561, and W.M.S. — \$449.

The membership is now 72. It was agreed that a letter be sent to Colonel J. B. Maclean, of Toronto, thanking him for his interest in the church, especially by providing gardeners to care for the church and cemetery grounds. Reference was also made to the gifts received during the year of a communion table and chair, pulpit lamp and hymn board, as well as donations to the mission funds, all given by Miss Catharine McIntosh, in loving memory of her sister, the late Miss Abbie McIntosh. Reverend T. G. M. Bryan presided at the meeting.

Meeting of Knox Church, Crieff Reveals Encouraging Reports January 28th 1948.

At the annual meeting of Knox Presbyterian Church, Crieff, on Monday, excellent reports were received from all departments of the church work. The Treasurer of the general fund, Mr. Wilfred Roszell, reported receipts of \$1,282 and a balance of \$218. The Missions Treasurer, James McDonald, reported \$239 received, which with \$20 from the Sunday School, made a total of \$259 contributed for Presbyterian Missions. The congregation therefore exceeded its \$250 allocation. The Women's Missionary Society also contributed \$101, the Ladies' Aid \$97, and the Sunday School \$38. Donald A. Stewart was secretary of the meeting.

The membership is now 71, five members being received on profession of faith during 1947, and six being removed by death and by certificate. The congregation lost three of its oldest members, Mrs. Henry Fixter, Mrs. Donald McMillan, and Mr. Archibald Scott. Mr. Scott was senior elder and Superintendent of the Sunday School for many years.

The following appointments were made: James McDonald and Charles Maltby to the Board of Managers for three years, Angus Smith and Donald A. Stewart, as Auditors, Wilfred Roszell as General Fund Treasurer, James McDonald as Mission Treasurer, Mrs. Russell Kerns as Presbyterian Record Secretary, and Miss Margaret Scott as Every Day Secretary.

Letter of Appreciation

It was agreed that a letter of appreciation be sent to Colonel J. B. Maclean, L.L.D., of Toronto, for providing gardeners to care for the church and cemetery grounds, and for his interest in the welfare of the church. Resolutions were also approved thanking Miss Catherine McIntosh and Frank Gartland for putting flowers in the church every Sunday.

The congregation voted to increase its cost of living bonus to the minister, Reverend T. G. M. Bryan, from \$75 to \$140 for the year 1948. Mr. Bryan thanked the congregation for their kindness and co-operation, as shown in so many ways, and spoke of the faithful service being given by its members and adherents. He also commended them for the fact that there was an average attendance of 55 last year at the ordinary services, with only 71 members and 50 families connected with the church, the average attendance being 69 in October.

Tablet Unveiled in Crieff Church June 28th 1948.

Sunday, in the Church at Crieff, a tablet was unveiled in memory of four young men, brothers John and Donald MacDonald, Clarence Huffman, and David Priest, who lost their lives while serving with the Highland Light Infantry in Great War Two. Veterans attended the ceremony, with the address delivered by Padre J. Y. Fraser.

Puslinch Church Enjoys Good Year January 29th 1949.

The annual meeting of Knox Presbyterian Church, Puslinch, was held in the church at Crieff, with good attendance. Wilfred Roszell was re-appointed treasurer of the general fund, and James McDonald, Treasurer of the Mission Fund. The retiring managers were Clarence Awde and Gilbert Hobson, and Gilbert Hobson and Andrew Scott were elected to the Board of Managers for three years. The auditors, Angus Smith and Donald A. Stewart, were re-elected.

A membership of 71 was reported, the same as in 1947. Two new members were received, Miss Mary McPherson and Miss Beatrice McRobbie. The congregation mourns the loss of two members and one adherent, Mrs. Flora McPherson, Miss Margaret McRobbie, and Mrs. Alexander McCormick. There were five children baptized during the year.

The financial reports showed receipts totalling \$2,343, of which, \$1,879 was for congregational purposes and \$464 for missionary purposes. The balance in the general fund at the end of 1948 was \$546. There was an increase of \$676 in the receipts for all purposes as compared to the previous year. The budget and W.M.S. allocations were both exceeded.

It was agreed that a letter be sent to Colonel J. B. Maclean, of Toronto, thanking him for his continued interest in the work of the congregation. The congregation voted to increase the honorarium to Mrs. M. Horning in appreciation of her services as organist and choir leader.

The minister, Reverend T. G. M. Bryan, was chairman of the meeting, and Donald A. Stewart was secretary. At the close, the ladies served refreshments.

Report 72 Members in Crieff Presbyterian Church February 3rd 1950.

The annual meeting of the Knox Presbyterian congregation, Puslinch, was held in the church at Crieff. Reverend T. G. M. Bryan was chairman and Stuart McDonald, secretary. Philip McDonald and James McDonald were re-appointed treasurers of the congregation. Harold Kerns and Donald A. Stewart were appointed to the Board of Managers for three years, in place of Kenneth McDonald and Wilfred Roszell. Philip McDonald was appointed for two years, in place of Charles Maltby. Duncan McAllister, Stuart McDonald, and James A. McPherson were elected trustees of the church. Angus Smith was appointed a trustee of Crown Cemetery, Puslinch, succeeding the late D. A. McNaughton.

A membership of 72 was reported, of which, 59 are resident members, and there were 35 on the roll of the Sabbath School. It was reported that there were 46 households connected with the congregation, and the average attendance in 1949 was 50, not including anniversary Sunday. Four new members were received, and the congregation lost three by death. The congregation mourns the loss of the following members and adherents: David A. Resolutions of appreciation were approved by the congregation to be sent to Colonel J. B. Maclean, of Toronto, Miss C. McIntosh, of Puslinch, George McKay, of Toronto, and F. Gartland, of Puslinch.

The reports of the various treasurers showed a total of \$1933 contributed for all purposes, of which, \$1509 was for congregational purposes, \$291 for the missionary budget, and \$130 for the work of the Women's Missionary Society. There was a balance of \$523 in the general fund at the end of the year.

It was decided to set up a reserve fund to be used for repairs to the church building in future years, and it was agree that \$100 from the balance in the general fund be placed in this new fund, with the hope that other contributions and bequests would be added to it through the years. Angus Smith, in supporting this resolution, stated that this plan had worked out very well in his home church in Scotland. Lunch was served by the ladies at the close of the meeting.

Cyclonic Storm Hits Puslinch Homes, Barns Badly Damaged

Scores of Trees Uprooted in Surprise Crieff Twister

Not since 1933 has a storm hit this area as severely as last night's miniature tornado in the Crieff area, 12 miles south of Guelph. Scores of trees were torn from the ground, roots and all, and strewn over roads and fields, and in one case over a shed.

Roads were blocked leading in and out of the district, and damage was estimated in the thousands of dollars. Hydro and telephone poles were also smashed to the ground as were field after field of crops, some ready to be harvested.

Knifing a fearsome, roaring path across the rich farmland near Crieff, a black, coneshaped cyclone last night blasted trees, lifted roofs, overturned sheds, and damaged homes and barns on half a dozen farms. In a few minutes, the 700 foot high twister had blocked three roads, frightened a number of families and done thousands of dollars worth of damage. Developing west of Crieff in the Puslinch area at about 6:15 p.m., the howling and inky-black spiral descended on the farms, wreaking havoc. It cut a path of destruction that ranged from 50 to 100 yards in width. Huge four-foot trees were torn up and flung about, cars were thrown 50 feet, roofs and verandas picked up bodily and crops ruined. It was no respecter of property but luckily no one was hurt.

It first seemed to appear in the swampland west of Crieff. Following a meandering path, it struck the farm of Martin Paddock on the Guelph Highway creating heavy losses. This farmer recently lost cattle in the last storm that struck the area. Then, it completely destroyed Fred Paddock's barn, 300 yards east. Continuing for another six miles, the twister barely touched the Archie Fraser farm, missed C. J. Awde's property, damaged that of William McCormick, severely wrecked the barns of Donald Stewart, ex-reeve of Puslinch, dispersed a wheat field of Alan Connell, and hit the farm of Russell Wyse.

Before 7:00 p.m., near Crieff, the twister suddenly lost its tail and broke up into a whirling wind. In its less than a half-hour course, it caused wide destruction. Most severely damaged were the farms of Martin Paddock, who also lost 11 cows recently when a tree was struck by lightning, William McCormick, and Donald Stewart. A number of people saw the cyclone, most of them wisely running for cover. It was vastly more destructive than a lesser one that hit the district in 1933. At that time, only trees, shingles, and some crops were damaged. This one was a monster that sucked up everything in its path.

"I happened to see it when it was about two fields away, to the west," said Mrs. M. Paddock, who was still shaken this morning. "It was like a huge, black cylinder, coming fast. I was at the back of the house and screamed at my husband to shut the doors and hide. He was at the cow stalls, some distance away. Then it hit us, with the whole house shaking in a loud humming roar."

The twister ripped much of the roof from the main Paddock barn, from above the owner's head. It wrenched the garage loose and sucked it up, to spread it over three fields. It pushed a large truck 20 yards and swung an auto over behind a tree. In the midst of the whirlpool of air and debris, part of the house roof was taken, while giant trees along the Guelph Highway, 100 feet away, were flattened across the road.

It was a strange scene, with the cyclone tracing an eccentric course. From an upstairs bedroom, it took one pair of curtains, leaving another. It lifted a car owned by Bob Wyse, Mrs. Paddock's brother, but set it down right side up. It destroyed a woodshed but left most of the boards flung across the field.

Curving in a south-easterly direction, it struck at the Fred Paddock barn and demolished it. Stooked wheat was dispersed, lying in clumps in several fields. Boards and torn trees were everywhere. After 6:30 p.m., the twister moved along the first Puslinch concession road and brought down trees on both sides of the Fraser farm and the road. It upended an outhouse and removed some shingles but did little damage. It acted like an undecided kittenish demon.

Still going southeast, it descended hard on the McCormick and Stewart farms. At the former, parts of both house and barn were removed, along with crop and tree damage. Redpainted steel roofing from the McCormick's farm was whirled through the air for a quarter of a mile and flung on the Stewart property.

A scene of nature's wrath was evident at the Stewart farm, some three miles from the Paddock's farm. Cutting over the field, the cyclone took another barn roof. It also lifted heavy boards from the floor of the barn, throwing some of them out through the wall like a javelin. A small shed was turned upside down and a cart chassis overturned.

Metal roof sheets were all about the farm. One shed was completely hanging up in trees. A mass of trees was down, blocking entry to the farm. One shed was completely covered by the fallen boughs. Here, the width of the twister was close to 150 yards. At the McCormick's, the roof was taken off of one house with another remaining intact. Grace Stewart, sister of the owner of the Stewart farm was alone in the when it struck. She was terrified.

Some nearby residents knew nothing about the cyclone. "I saw something black and moving, with what appeared to be crows flying around," said one. It was only after discussion that we decided that the "crows" weren't birds at all but the pieces of trees, debris, wheat, and roofs, which were twirling about in the deadly funnel. A second man remarked that it seemed like a "cloud airplane" and I didn't think anymore about it.

Donald Stewart luckily has wind insurance but some of the others aren't so lucky. It seems likely that the nearby residents and neighbours of those that were hardest hit will be pitching in to give a hand in clearing the trees and debris. It is impossible to estimate the damage loss with any accurate figure, but it is heavy. Puslinch Township will have sizeable expenses clearing roads of big trees and telephone and hydro wires.

The people of Crieff district won't forget for many a day the twister of July 18th 1952 which caused such wanton destruction.

Tornado Rips Through Farming District East of Galt Smashes Buildings, Tears up Grain Fields

Twister Hurls Buildings in Air, Rips up Crops

Crieff, July 19th---- A cyclone that lifted buildings high into the air and then spewed them out of its funnel like matchwood, ripped grain from the fields and carried house roofs away, swept through a narrow path in this farming district 12 miles east of Galt last night. Performing the usual freaks of such twisters, it picked clothing from bedrooms and sucked them into the air, tossed an automobile 50 feet, but injured no person in its 12 mile course.

Half a dozen farms along the way were battered but only three suffered serious damage. This morning it was impossible to estimate the total damage but it was expected to amount to tens of thousands of dollars.

At the farm of Donald Stewart, a former reeve of Puslinch Township, a metal barn roof was smashed and scattered into trees 150 yards from its original location. A smaller barn was destroyed. The Stewart farm is about four miles from the Martin Paddock farm, the first farm struck.

Damage was also done on the farm of William McCormick. Three concession roads were blocked by trees, including the road to Guelph. Alex Connell, looking out over his farmlands, saw the black funnel coming from a mile away.

The worst damage was on the farm of Martin Paddock but the family of Mr. and Mrs. Paddock and their six young sons escaped injury. Some of the lads, who had been indoors, were found after the blow had passed, hiding under their beds.

Coming at about 6:20 p.m., the twister was seen by Mrs. Paddock as she stood at the back door of the farm home. "It came like a huge black cylinder," she said, "and I first saw it when it was two fields away. I yelled to my husband who was in the cow stalls, telling him to shut the door, but I don't think he heard me."

"I grabbed one of the boys and jumped back into the house and crouched against a wall. The twister shook the whole house and I thought that it would blow away. The roof was torn from two upstairs bedrooms," Mrs. Paddock said. "Clothing was sucked up into the skies. Curtains in one room were whipped from the windows but in the other they were unharmed."

Inside the cow shed, Mr. Paddock huddled with the frightened animals and said later that he thought that the shed would come crashing down around him.

In front of the Paddock farm a dozen huge trees at the roadside were uprooted and flung across the highway. Some were four feet thick. The roof of one barn went sailing into the air and a garage was completely destroyed. Planks were scattered about the fields. A passenger car was lifted and carried 50 feet but was put down right side up and undamaged.

Two hundred yards along the road, the barn owned by Fred Paddock was smashed to bits.

From the Connell place, the funnel went off in the direction of Russell Wyse's farm where its tail seemed to twist loose.

Hundreds of Motorists at Puslinch to See Wind Damage July 21st 1952.

Hundreds of motorists visited the cyclone damaged section in south Puslinch Township on Sunday to view the damage done by Friday night's twister. There was a steady flow of vehicles into the area from early morning until dark. The majority visited the Martin Paddock farm on Highway 52, which suffered the most damage. The road was lined with cars for long distances.

Saturday morning, after township officials had surveyed the damage done, they organized groups of farmers from the neighbourhood to clear three roads blocked by fallen trees. The men, equipped with power saws and tractors, soon had the roads open to traffic. However, the job at the Martin Paddock farm was a big task, on account of the size of four huge elm trees that had been uprooted and blocked the entire road. Only a lane was cleared through this debris, just wide enough for one car to pass.

It was rather a pathetic scene at this farm, with a homemade sign, "No admittance, please" erected inside the fence, but the curious paid no attention to it and tramped over the farm to get a better view of the damage at the rear of the building. Men were at work on the roof of the house, making temporary repairs and providing protection where the dwelling was unroofed.

Hundreds of cars also travelled up the 1st Concession and then turned into the sideroad to view the damage done at Donald Stewart's farm. People marvelled as they viewed a huge sheet of roofing metal twisted around branches of a forty-foot tree near the roadside, at least 100 yards away from the barn.

The cyclone performed some odd tricks. As an example, the Stewart home was undamaged, as also was a nearby garage, but in front of the house, a huge willow and other trees were uprooted.

The twister took shape west of the Martin Paddock farm, and its erratic course could be followed by the trees that were broken and uprooted as it followed a south easterly path, missing a number of farm buildings, only to vent its force further on.

The Morriston service station probably did the biggest day's business in its history.

Neighbouring farmers expressed sympathy for the Martin Paddock family, the heaviest sufferers from the cyclone. There was some talk on Sunday of starting a benefit fund to help them repair the extensive damage done to the house and barn. The Paddocks did not have wind insurance, but Donald Stewart did, after he had suffered damage in a similar storm back in 1933.
