Puslinch Items **from the Killean correspondent** **July 5th 1866.**

The Midge – We regret to notice that this grain destroyer has made its appearance in this locality, not only on the wheat crop, but also on barley and rye. It is to be hoped that the early sown grain is so far ahead that it may escape with little injury, but late and spring grain stands a bad chance, as the insects are to be seen actually black on the stock.

Statute Labour – Till within a very few years, the road which leads across the township from Galt to the Brock Road was a mere apology for the term. Hills, ruts, and swamps made it all but impassable for months in the year. Now, however, we are glad to notice that under the indefatigable Mr. Duncan McDonald, who has had the superintendence of the Crieff section for some years past, he has brought it to a state of perfection that may well vie with any macadam highway in the province.

Oil matters were thought to have been defunct hereabouts, but the geologist from the States, who was here last winter, and who abruptly disappeared some time ago, is again amongst us, and it is understood that one or more wells will be immediately sunk, a consummation devoutly to be wished.

School Meeting in Puslinch **January 20th 1868.**

At a numerously attended meeting, of the ratepayers of School Section No. 7, Puslinch, met for the purpose, at Killean, on the evening of the 16th instant, it was moved by Mr. Peter McPherson, seconded by Mr. John Thompson, that the thanks of this meeting be tendered to Angus McKellar, Esq., who has acted in the capacity of School Trustee in the section for the past three years, and who now retires. Mr. John McIntyre followed in a lengthened and able speech, eulogizing the conduct of Mr. McKellar during his incumbency of the office, in which great improvements have been inaugurated and carried out, beneficial to the section, and having a personal acquaintance with Mr. McKellar for the past 25 years, he always found him to be the same obliging and urbane neighbour, and wished him long to remain in their midst. The meeting unanimously acquiesced in the speaker's expressions, and tendered their best thanks and good wishes to Mr. McKellar and family.

August 26th 1868.

New School House – In a former communication, I took occasion to notice the great improvements made in this village within the past few years, and now the inhabitants of School Section 7, of Puslinch Township, may congratulate themselves on having one of the finest and most artistically finished stone buildings for school purposes that there is in the country. Mr. Robert Little, whose mission appears to be to erect seminaries of learning, has been the contractor, and well has he done his part. So well, indeed, that the building was taken off his hands by the trustees, without the usual formality and expense of employing a public inspector, its completion according to specification being apparent and satisfactory. With a laudable public spirit, the trustees and people of the section intend to have a bell hung in the edifice, and in order to defray part of the cost thereof, and moreover, to commemorate the opening event, a tea meeting is to be held in the new building on the evening of the 10th of September. The Reverend Messrs. Smith, McDonald, and McLean, and Mr. Atkinson, of Morriston, will address the meeting, and should Mr. K. McKenzie have returned home by that time from his trip to Rupert's Land, he is expected to give some interesting account of matters in that region. The Galt Brass Band will enliven the occasion with their sweet strains, and as the young ladies of the district never do things by halves, and as their talents in the cooking art are well known, there can be no doubt but that a pleasant and profitable evening will be the result.

**Tea Meeting at Killean
October 10th 1876.**

For many years, the festivals held at Killean, in connection with the Sabbath School, have been renowned for every good principal that make such gatherings a pleasant reunion of members of the section, as well as many neighbouring friends, who kindly participate in the enjoyment. Notwithstanding the very unpropitious state of the weather on Friday evening last, the school-house was quite crowded with the youth of the district. A sumptuous table of good things was amply provided by the young ladies of the section, whose captivating manners persuaded all to partake freely of the abundance provided. Delightful music was rendered throughout the evening by the Hespeler Choir members, to whom thanks are due for their gratuitous services. Reverends Messrs. McAllister, of Hespeler, and McDiarmid, of West Puslinch, made able and most interesting speeches on the occasion. On the whole, this was one of the most successful meetings ever held in Killean.

**West Puslinch
November 14th 1877.**

The Presbyterian Sabbath School of West Puslinch closed for the season on the 4th instant. A social was held in the church on the following Friday, when twenty-one books were given as prizes to the children for general proficiency, good conduct, and regular attendance. Several of the children repeated the shorter catechism from beginning to end, together with verses of Psalms and passages of Scripture. The prize books were provided by the teachers with their own money and indeed they are worthy of honourable mention for the interest they have taken in this work during the past seven months. The children's penny contributions are to be given to the orphans' mission in India. This was the best examination ever held there.

**Surprise Party and Presentation at Killean
December 24th 1877.**

About seventy of the pupils attending the public school at Killean, in order to show their goodwill and esteem to their late teacher, Mr. McPherson, who is leaving to fill the important position of Principal of Arthur Village school, paid his residence a visit of surprise on the evening of Friday last, to testify the regret with which they feel his removal, and as utility accompanies philanthropy in this progressive age, they did not come empty-handed. Baskets upon baskets of good things were unpacked from the democrats until the tables groaned beneath the burden, after which being duly partaken of, the following address was read by Mr. John Gilchrist: —

To A. McPherson, Esq., on his leaving Killean, by the scholars attending S. S. No.7, Puslinch, 22nd December, 1877.

Dear Teacher:

We, the undersigned, on behalf of our fellow scholars at Killean School, who have enjoyed the benefit of your unwearied exertions as our teacher for the past eight years, would respectfully and sorrowfully tender you this address on the occasion of your leaving us to fill a more important position in your profession. We fully recognize your capable, kind, and indefatigable labour as instructor for this length of time, your great and good example, temporal and spiritual, in raising us up in knowledge, your successful endeavour to maintain the Sabbath School and prayer meetings, and your uniform correct and Christian conduct, make us realize with deepest regret your early departure. Long may the "Great Teacher" spare you in your career of usefulness. Therefore, as a slight memento of your kind regard and esteem, we beg your acceptance of this gold chain for yourself, and this silver butter cooler for Mrs. McPherson, as tokens of affection.

With every wish for your future success, prosperity, and welfare, we are, your loving pupils,

Mr. McPherson suitably and feelingly thanked his young friends for the very handsome and valuable presents given himself and family, and was glad that he possessed what was still more precious to him, their love and esteem. He had lived happily amongst them and received many marks of their regard in the past, and sincerely hoped that the Giver of all good things might abundantly bless and make their paths pleasant through life.

Social at Killean March 19th 1883.

A social was held at Killean on Friday evening last, for the purpose of raising funds in connection with the Presbyterian Church. There was a large attendance. A number of people were present from Hespeler, Guelph, and surrounding country.

After thorough justice had been done to the "good things" provided by the ladies, which were specially enjoyed by those who had driven from a distance, the programme was opened with a selection from the choir. A recitation was then given by Mr. Galbraith, "Bernardo Del Carpio". Mr. Peter Gilchrist was then called upon, who, in a short speech, pointed out the difficulties endured in his early days to procure an education, and the superior advantages now enjoyed. A very humorous address was next delivered by Mr. John Gilchrist. Mr. Dickie and Dr. McPhatter also delivered addresses, the latter a practical and eloquent speech on success in life, well illustrated with examples of men who had succeeded. Addresses and recitations were

also delivered by Rife, Bannatyne, Stewart, and M. McPhatter. The ease and fluency with which the younger men delivered their addresses would have done credit to older and more experienced speakers. The musical portion of the programme was well sustained by the Misses Gilchrist and Scott and Misses McMillan and McCormick. The choir of the Methodist Church, Hespeler, entertained the audience with several choice selections. All of these were rendered in an admirable style, and were greatly appreciated.

The chair was filled by Mr. Knowles, of Hespeler, who is "an old favourite" in this locality, in his usual happy and genial manner. All departed well satisfied with the hospitality and the treat supplied them by the good people of Killean.

Social at Killean

March 27th 1885.

The annual social in connection with the West Presbyterian Church of Puslinch was held at Killean schoolhouse on Friday evening last. Notwithstanding the severity of the night, a very great gathering enjoyed themselves during the evening. The meeting was organized by the appointment of Mr. Duncan Ferguson as chairman, and after the playing of a martial strain from the bagpipes of Mr. McLellan, the Killean piper, the entertainment was opened by very interesting speeches from Messrs. Thomas Cowan of Galt, Dickie and Cunningham of Hespeler, Gilchrist of Killean, and Archibald Marshall of Morrison. These gentlemen acquitted themselves with great satisfaction to the audience. The Hespeler choir with their elegant organ, at intervals, contributed greatly to the enjoyment of the evening. The local and vocal young ladies, Misses Gilchrist, Bond, Scott, and McCormick, along with Messrs. Valick and Scott, from Morrison, made the meeting a very pleasant night indeed. Killean has ever been famous for the culinary supplies furnished by its lady contributors, and this occasion was no exception.

Killean Correspondence
Noble Boys and a Generous Act
March 31st 1887.

Our correspondent sends the following: The other day there came to the Killean School in Puslinch, for the first time this season, a poor ragged boy. The tatters he wore were, as is often in such cases, too large for his person, being made first for some grown man. However, they were the best garments the poor fellow had the morning he came to school. All the rest of the boys saw his wants as to clothing, and it appears that each of the boys saw his duty, for no sooner did they get out at noon recess than they went in a body to the store and ordered Mrs. Ferguson to get up a new suit from the stockings to the hat to cover his head. When the clothes were ready, the presentation took place, and each boy vied with the others to get them on the young fellow after stripping him of the old duds. Erastus Laur and Peter Clarke, two of the oldest boys, made the presentation, and I can assure you that your correspondent has seen

presentations and heard speeches for the last forty-five years at least, but nothing in true originality to this performance, which I wish many much older boys would copy. After the boy was newly clad and standing before the rest, one boy asked him if his people would know him when he would go home in his new dress. He answered that he thought his father would know him yet, although his looks were greatly changed since he left in the morning for school.

The Killean Correspondence

December 5th 1887.

Re-engaged – Mr. James Ramsay, teacher of our section, has been re-engaged for next year. Mr. Ramsay's services deserve a recognition in the shape of an increased salary. Miss Janet Gilchrist, of Killean, at present teaching in Dresden, has been engaged for next year by the trustees of that place.

Finished – The now famous Mr. Adam Young has, at length, finished the most successful season's threshing that he was ever engaged in, and intends celebrating his victory over other competitors by treating his numerous customers to an oyster supper at Puslinch Lake Hotel on Christmas eve. A large number of invitations are already issued.

Speculation – Mr. Archibald McCormick, well and favourably known here, intends giving up agricultural pursuits, to speculate in horses, having already purchased six valuable animals in the neighbourhood of St. Thomas.

Slight Raise – In consequence of the change in the weather, our boarding establishments have decided to protect themselves by a slight raise in the tariff.

An Old Visitor – Mr. John Thompson, of Dakota, is on a visit to his numerous friends in Puslinch. Mr. Thompson was one of the first settlers of Puslinch, coming from Scotland over half a century ago, taking up Lot No. 10, 1st Concession of Puslinch, then, of course, nothing but a forest. About eight years ago, he retired to Hespeler, and subsequently moved with his family to Dakota, where he now resides. Although eighty years of age, Mr. Thompson is still hale and hearty, and his long journey did not inconvenience him in the least. Although it is only a few years since he left us, he finds great changes have taken place during his absence, and most of his former companions and neighbours are now lying in the quiet burying ground of Killean.

Returned – Miss Annie Gilchrist has returned from a long visit to her friends in Harriston. Miss Sarah Schaumberg has also returned from a visit to her friends in Waterloo. Both young ladies look as though they enjoyed themselves. Mr. Jno. McMaster, of Washington Territory, formerly a resident of Killean, is at present visiting his friends here and elsewhere in the county. Mr. McMaster looks as if the climate of the Far West agreed with him.

February 6th 1888.

The Love of Money is the Root of all Evil --- That the severe criticism of "Fair Play" and "Onlooker" (anonymous contributors to the local newspapers) is justifiable may be seen from the fact that the majority of the Hespeler citizens censure the destruction of our church and sympathize with the people of Puslinch in their efforts to prevent an old landmark from being destroyed through the Christian motives of greed or spite, but sympathy is of little use this time as the real estate agents of the Hespeler Methodist congregation have put the matter in the hands of the County Crown Attorney, and the old Apsotolic Creed that Christians ought not go to the law is likely to be violated for the sake of \$50.00. Verily, the filthy lucre must be a scarce article among them when they would put themselves in such unenvious prominence for the possibility of securing that sum.

Satisfactory --- A new threshing machine has been a long felt want in this section and we learn with pleasure from your Puslinch Lake correspondent that Mr. Antony Robertson has purchased an entire outfit. Mr. Robertson is well and favourably known here and will doubtless receive a large share of the well-deserved patronage of a large number of farmers in this locality.

Information --- The Hespeler correspondent to the Galt Reformer newspaper, although correct in saying that very little Christianity is shown in regard to the Ellis Church, is altogether wrong in supposing Puslinch to be a sleepy little Township and we are obliged to inform him that the little rest that we do take is considerably disturbed at present by the barking of our dogs at Hespeler speculators coming out to inspect the church property.

Killean Correspondence

April 24th 1888.

Raising --- The first raising of the season took place last week on the farm of Messrs. Alex and Peter Wilkinson, 2nd Concession, who have added a commodious driving shed to their list of buildings. The carpenter work was done by Messrs. Musser & Gilchrist.

Personal --- Mr. James McCaig, of the 3rd Concession, Puslinch, leaves for the North West next Tuesday. Mr. John McGregor, of the Townline, has also departed for Manitoba. Mr. William Scott, of Chicago, is on a visit to his parents and friends of the Gore. Mr. George Collins has commenced practice in Hespeler.

Enterprising --- Mr. George Laur is determined to spare no effort preparing for the competition of the ensuing threshing season as he has just purchased a new 13 horse power engine from White & Co., London. Mr. Laur is at present engaged making shingles, having lately purchased a shingle mill from Mr. Robert Palmer, of Clyde.

Stray Dogs --- The owner of those two hounds, which are at present perambulating the country, if he attaches any value to them, had better shut them up, as they will be likely to meet with an untimely end.

Settled --- Messrs. Ellis' and Little's exhaustive letters have evidently settled the church controversy, as no attempt has been made to secure possession by the Hespeler speculators. The residents in the vicinity are organizing a Sunday School to be held there as soon as the weather will be warm enough to dispense with the services of a wood fire. Parties attending from a distance will be obliged to walk or leave their horses exposed to the summer sun as the sheds are serving a purpose elsewhere.

Killean Correspondence May 15th 1888.

Our school --- Our scholars have maintained their high reputation in the recent promotion examination. Ten of Mr. Ramsay's pupils were successful, out of fifteen sent up, a large percentage, as a number of the pupils passed examinations last year. Only three, however, were successful out of those who passed last year. Miss Georgina Munroe and Miss Maggie Gilchrist passed for 5th this year and 4th last year. Mr. Chas. McMillan passed for 4th this year and 3rd last year. Mr. Ramsay has now a 5th class of nine scholars, none of whom exceed the age of fifteen years and four of whom passed the Galt entrance examination last year. We confess that we are somewhat curious to know if there is another class in the inspectorate that will equal this.

Accident --- Mr. John Wilkinson met with an accident last week at the farm of Mr. Henry Bond. While removing the box of the wagon, the horses started, throwing him to the ground and the entire wagon passed over him. Although painful, his injuries are not serious and he will soon be alright again.

Narrow escape --- Mr. Adam Young had an adventure with a colt last week which was not altogether pleasant. While endeavouring to catch the horse, the vicious animal turned on him. Mr. Young took refuge behind a friendly stump where he was obliged to remain the entire forenoon. Mr. John Ramsay fortunately came that way and succeeded in driving the brute off.

Fishing --- Notwithstanding nets and other unlawful means of fishing, the suckers have commenced to run at last and vast quantities have been speared since the 1st of May in the outlet. We hear some tall trout stories from Mill Creek.

Sad Death --- Willie McGregor, son of Mr. Andrew McGregor, townline, died on Tuesday last, aged 8 years. The bereaved parents have the sympathy of the entire community.

June 12th 1888.

Shingle Sawing – Mr. Adam Young secured the contract of sawing the shingles for Mr. Richard Paddock's new barn, engaging Mr. Wheeler, of Freelton, who had the job completed inside of five days. This is a somewhat new industry in this locality.

Roads – Farmers have commenced statute labour again. We are pleased to notice that the township council is going to expend some more on "Scott's" side road. This road has been in a bad condition for some time. The condition of the side road between Lots 10 and 11, on the 2nd Concession, is open to criticism. This road was not opened until a few years ago, when our council expended \$200, in a very praiseworthy manner, from one end to the other. The manner in which the money was expended met with the approval of everybody, as the roadway, over half a mile long and for the most part small trees and underbrush, with no less than five ponds, two of them nearly 100 yards in extent each, had to be crossed. No statute labour being put on the road, it has not improved any, and being our most direct route to Guelph, we would like to see it put in a passable condition.

Extras – Councillors Stewart and McLean will let several road contracts in this vicinity on the 12th. Several barn raisings are to come off soon. We hope that football will keep Puslinch Lake ramblers employed on Saturday evening. The Messrs. Laur expect to secure several road contracts. Mr. Neil McMillan has been sojourning in this locality for some time past. A suit comes before our Justices of the Peace this week. Two fine showers occurred on Sunday; crops are looking well. Mr. William Gilchrist, teacher, Cumminsville, spent the 24th of May here. Mrs. Alex McIntyre, of Niagara, has been visiting her many friends in Puslinch lately. Miss Annie Gilchrist, of Arkell, passed through here on her way to Niagara with her aunt, Mrs. McIntyre. The scholars picnic is to come off soon. The Killean correspondence did not appear lately, owing to our being engaged on a Government contract. Our auctioneer will not go to Manitoba, having secured a more lucrative situation from Wright & Co., Texas.

The Village News from Killean

April 18th 1890.

Public Examination – Our school held its annual public examination on Thursday the 3rd inst., and was, as usual, a great success. The teacher, Mr. S. Charlton, is very popular in this section, as was shown by the very large attendance, although the roads could not have been worse. The teacher was assisted in the examination of the classes by Misses Pringle and Scott, and Messrs. Dickson, Kennawin, Cameron, and Taylor. The promotion examinations have recently been held in this county, and if the answering of the pupils may be taken as a test of their ability, we may expect to see our school stand high in the list.

When the classes were over, Mr. Gilchrist was appointed chairman, and a long and interesting programme was rendered. The singing of the pupils was largely applauded. Among those from a distance who took part was Miss Pringle, of Galt, who recited in her usual pleasant and able manner. At noon, the ladies of the section, with their usual liberality, provided for the inner man, and were accorded a hearty vote of thanks. The day's proceedings were then closed by singing "God be with you till we meet again" and with prayer by Mr. Kennawin.

The News from Killean

June 13th 1890.

Carnival – Nearly all the young people and children, as well as a number of the aged, are intending to go to the Carnival, one day at least, and doubtless they will be well paid for their trouble. It is not the cedar bushes that are being so tastefully arranged that are the attraction of the people in this community, as we can see plenty of those any day we wish to look out the window, but it is the excellent programme that is being provided by the committee. We hope that those who are engaged in this matter may be amply paid for their trouble.

Accident – Messrs. Wm. And George Lohr came very near losing a valuable black horse a few days ago. The animal got his foot over the tie-rope and was thrown in the stall, and by his efforts to get on his feet again, bruised himself very badly about the head, side, and front leg. We hope that he may be in a condition to do his work by threshing time.

Services – The Sabbath evening meetings, which have been carried on by Mr. McPherson, are now in the charge of Messrs. Cavers and Struthers for a few weeks.

July 17th 1891.

The Late Angus McCormick — Another of the early settlers of the township has passed away. Mr. Angus McCormick died at his residence in Puslinch on February 13th, in the 67th year of his age. He was born near Tarbert, Kintyre, Argyleshire, Scotland, in 1824, the youngest of a family of seven sons, who have preceded him to "the land from whence no traveller ere returns", all of whom, with their parents, sleep in our quiet cemetery. Mrs. John Thompson, of Bathgate, Dakota, is now the only surviving member of this well known family, whose energy and perseverance have left us so many traces in this locality. Arriving in Puslinch in 1837, they were among the first settlers and their experience and hospitality were at the disposal of later arrivals, whose hearts they cheered by their friendly welcome and encouraged by their example. Mr. McCormick was married in 1851 to Miss Barbara Blair, and they settled on Lot 18, Gore of Puslinch, and subsequently, on Front Lot 20, where he remained until his death. Up to the past year, he always enjoyed good health, but recently his health failed until he finally passed away quietly, and was buried in Killean on Monday, the 15th. Mr. McCormick shared

many of the good qualities of his family. Upright and honourable in his dealings and of a kindly disposition, he won many sincere friends. He leaves a widow, two sons, and four daughters.

**Sudden Death in Puslinch
July 21st 1898.**

The Galt Reporter of Saturday says that John Lorne Ramsay, youngest son of Mrs. Alex Ramsay, of the Gore of Puslinch, died very suddenly and unexpectedly at about three o' clock on that morning. At that hour, moans were heard coming from the young man's bedroom, and on going to his side, two or three members of the family were just in time to hold him in their arms ere the spark of life flickered out.

“Puslinch School Life in 1850’s Centred Around Old-Fashioned Log Building”

Methods of education in the 1850’s in Puslinch Township are recalled in an interesting article today by Katharine Gilchrist Day from information supplied by a resident in those years.

The light from the candle of learning in the 1850’s, though dim and feeble, began to show itself in the appearance of the log school house, which was erected on an acre of land, cleared from the primeval forest. This particular log school became know as No. 7 of Puslinch, as it was the seventh to be erected in that municipality.

The building had few of the requirements of the modern school. A number of long benches were arranged around the room. On these, the children sat and held their slates and books. Later, a long double desk was provided for writing, the boys using one of the slanting sides, the girls the other. A map of the world, a map of Europe, as it was then divided, a teacher’s desk and chair, and a very large box stove comprised the equipment.

The Department of Public Instruction, in Toronto, authorized magistrates to grant certificates to teachers as they deemed fit. The teachers, thus qualified were hired by the trustees. Their remuneration was raised by fees paid by the parents of each pupil, at first, and later by a general tax levy.

One of the first teachers was Mr. Neil Currie, a native of the island of Arran, who proved himself to be a natural genius in the community. He was given his certificate by Squire Heath who was a United Empire Loyalist and very particular that the teacher be a loyal British subject and well acquainted with the names of the Royal family. Mr. Currie was able to fulfill these requirements and many more. He was an expert conveyancer, inventor, carpenter, and tailor. He was known to write a complicated property deed, correct to detail, and all the time be telling a thrilling ghost story. He believed in the superstitions common to the time, but regretted that personal contact with the spirits, that seemed so common, could not be established. He would sleep in haunted houses, but to his disappointment the apparitions would not appear to him.

Mr. Currie would make neat pens for the pupils from goose quills as well as manufacture the ink. This was made by boiling soft maple bark to which was added copperas and sugar. He could write "The Lord's Prayer" beautifully within a circle the size of an English penny. His term of service was cut short by his determination to obtain a deed for a farm directly from the Queen herself for his services to Her Majesty in the Rebellion of 1837.

Another teacher of this decade was Mr. Wm. McGregor. He was well qualified to teach the primary grades and music. He was a Precentor in the local Presbyterian Church and drilled the scholars well in the best hymn tunes. To these tunes, he would have the pupils sing the "Psalms of David". Some of the pious parents in the section objected to such common use of the sacred psalms, so this practice had to be discontinued. However, not to be outdone in the correlation of music and poetry, Mr. McGregor had his classes sing other poems to these tunes.

Mr. Alexander McIntyre was the next teacher. He was a scholar and well qualified to teach the full school curriculum. When obtaining his certificate, one of the magistrate's oral questions was, "When was Scotland conquered?" He immediately replied, "Never!", after which he received his certificate.

By this time, the light of learning, though still a candle, was growing brighter. The young pioneer graduates from the common schools of the 1850's, the grandparents and great grandparents of the present generation, proved themselves well able to most successfully carry on their share in the development of this county and have earned for themselves an enviable reputation for their achievements in advancing rural life in the history of this part of Canada.

**Robert Fixter, 85, of Killean, is one of Puslinch Pioneers
July 28th 1952.**

Met one of the friendliest and most entertaining old timers the other afternoon when we visited the Scott Fixter farm on the 2nd Concession of Puslinch Township, Killean district, and spent a pleasant hour conversing with Robert Fixter, now in his 86th year. He is one of the oldest men in the district and despite his great years, tends to the garden and enjoys it.

Asked how he felt, he lit his pipe, his best friend, and replied, "Not too bad, if it wasn't for the rheumatism in my legs and that I haven't any teeth". Then, he chuckled.

At this stage, as he reclined in a chair on the verandah, the cameraman's flash bulb went off. With a laugh, he remarked, "Oh, you shot me. I hope it's good." We consider the picture to be one of the finest character studies we have seen in a long time!

Robert Fixter was born in Lincolnshire, England, and, as a young man, joined the constabulary there. "But I didn't like police work, especially when I had to deliver a summons to a man and found that he lived with a bunch of ragged kids. That was too much for me, so I quit and came to Canada when I was 21 years of age."

Since farm work was the chief means of employment back in the 1880's, Fixter located in Puslinch township and worked for a time for one Donald Stewart, and then for John Scott, who had 500 acres of land, of which, the present Fixter farm was a part.

John Scott was one of the pioneer settlers of Puslinch. Fixter married Margaret Scott and they went to Ottawa, where he worked for four years at the experimental farm. "My wife didn't like city life. She was used to milking cows and feeding the hens, so we returned to Puslinch and the Scott farm", he explained, and he has been there ever since. The two Scott boys in the meantime got their own farms.

The Fixters got possession of the old homestead upon the death of Mrs. Scott, who bequeathed it to the daughter for as long as she lived, and then it was to pass on to the oldest of the Fixter family, Scott, who is now operating it. Thus, the Scott farm has been in the one family for more than 100 years.

The original house was built of logs, but 65 years ago it was replaced by a substantial stone dwelling built out of field stone gathered from the farms. There is a stone silo, 30 feet by 12 feet, one of the first to be built in Puslinch, and it is sunk 10 feet into the ground. Mr. Fixter Senior said that he carted most of the stone that went into its construction, and it was noticeable that there wasn't a crack visible in it, a tribute to the stonemasons of long ago.

Mr. Fixter has now lived on the same farm for over 50 years, and with great pride, he declared that this year's wheat crop was the best ever taken off that farm, which is equipped with all of the most modern equipment, even to a threshing machine.

The present Fixter farm contains 300 acres; in fact, it is comprised of three 100-acre tracts. Through the one on the south side of the road, where the house and barn are located, the C.P.R. runs. On the opposite side of the road is the second farm, sown to grain, and behind it is another 100 acres of swampy and bush land, which is used only for pasturing the cattle.

Mention of that swamp brought back to memory to the old timer, the cyclone of Friday night, July 18th. "It was terrible", he explained, "just missed the house and then hit Martin Paddock's, which is the next farm to us. It started to form about a mile and a quarter to the north and cut a wide swath through the bush on our second farm, uprooting or breaking down trees. You can plainly see where it travelled. You won't believe it but that cyclone lifted a green basswood tree, with a trunk 30 feet long, weighing about a ton, six men couldn't lift it, carried it 120 yards and dropped it in the centre of a 10-acre hay field."

To satisfy our new-found friend, we had him pilot our car through three fields to see for ourselves just what damage a cyclone can do. And there was plenty of evidence on every hand. In the hay field there were several bare patches where the wind cone had bounced the big basswood tree on the ground before dropping it.

Returning to the subject of smoking, we asked the bewhiskered old gent how long he had been using the pipe. "Over 60 years", he replied, "but don't tell the preacher; he won't like it". He explained that it was when he was a policeman, back in Lincolnshire, that he took up

smoking. When the police sat around at night at the station, they would be smoking, and that was how he got the habit.

Besides his son, Scott, Mr. Fixter has three daughters, Mrs. Margaret Major, of Eramosa, Mrs. Grace Lindsay, near Jarvis, and Mrs. Oliver Awde, of the 1st Concession, of Puslinch.

With his optimistic outlook on life and his refreshing sense of humour, Robert Fixter should live to enjoy many more years.

Raw Winds Greet 1955 Threshing Debut January 23rd 1955.

One of the latest threshings believed ever held in these parts took place Wednesday when Alex E. Ramsay, of Killean, threshed his 1954 crop of wheat. It was of good quality, hard, and the yield ran about 35 bushels to the acre. When we asked the farmer, "Why are you threshing in the middle of the winter?", Ramsay went on to explain that his straw house was full and he needed more room. The straw house was again filled before the threshing was complete and the balance had to be blown outside. Jack Welsh's threshing machine, from Clyde, was used and a tractor provided the power. There was a raw, piercing wind blowing outdoors when we arrived, but the gang of threshers said that it was quite comfortable in the barn. Threshing is still a dirty job. The upper picture (not shown) features one of the men feeding the grain in sheaves onto an endless belt that carries it into the machine which separated the wheat from the straw. In the lower picture are the men who took part in the threshing, left to right, Alex Ramsay, owner of the farm, and his neighbours, Richard MacMillan, Jack Welsh, Dave Paddock, and Oswald Ramsay, his cousin of the proprietor. Wm. Lyon MacKenzie Hid in Turnip Cellar at Killean

Often wonder if we appreciate the great historical values in this district. For example, take Killean, a few miles east of Galt, on the Gore of Puslinch Township. There is an area that is steeped in tradition. It was pioneered by Scottish immigrants who reached that area as early as 1812.

Spent a most interesting afternoon touring that section, piloted by Mrs. Christina Walzer, the Reporter's Killean correspondent, a widely travelled woman, a writer and one-time columnist with a U.S. newspaper. She is a living bureau of information, having made a close study of the history of "The Gore", where she was born. Without hesitation, she called off the names of the original settlers of the farms. She now makes her home with Miss Mary McCormick, another descendant of a pioneer family, after whom McCormick's Point at Puslinch Lake was named.

Our first stop was at the rather neglected Killean Cemetery, where the first settlers of the district were laid to rest. One of the first burials there was of Mrs. Walzer's great grandfather, Archibald Ramsay. The headstone on the family plot relates that he died on August 19th 1858, at the age of 89, and that his wife had predeceased him on September 19th 1856, in her 79th year. At the bottom of the stone is this inscription, "Both natives of Kintyre, Argyleshire, Scotland, emigrated to Canada in 1812". Near this plot is buried Norman Ramsay, a brother of Archibald, a bachelor, who passed away in 1852. In this same burial ground were interred Mrs. Walzer's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Douglas McLarty.

An Old Store

Immediately adjoining the cemetery, to the west, there is an old stone building that many, many years ago was a general store operated by Donald and Louie Ferguson, on a farm that is now the property of Reeve Bob Barber, of Hespeler, but the buildings are now unoccupied and the arable land is not being worked.

Where Descendants Lived

Directly across the road from the Barber farm is that of Mrs. Walzer's great grandparents, the Dougald McLartys. It is now in a neglected condition, but on it are the ruins of the old log house built by the pioneer Ramsays, at one time located in an orchard. Back of it, in about the centre of the field, there is the old log barn, still in good shape. A winding creek borders the southern limits of this old farm and it will be remembered by the natives of the district for its old swimming hole, one of the most popular spots in the area.

Protected Rebel Leader

According to tradition, not confirmed, but generally believed by the old-time residents of "The Gore", William Lyon MacKenzie, the rebel leader of 1837, was hidden for three days in the Ramsay turnip cellar, when a price was put on his head. It is a well known fact, which gives credence to the story, that MacKenzie, after whom the late Prime Minister of Canada, William Lyon MacKenzie King, received his name, passed through that district, heading west, and avoided Galt. The men of the then village of Shade's Mill had been called to the colours and were issued old muzzle loaders, with three sided bayonets, (We have one of them among our souvenirs.) to man the Main Street bridge to prevent MacKenzie from crossing the river. However, the faithful guides of the rebel knew better than to come through Galt and forded the river some distance above the settlement, leading him through trails in the wilderness west of the river and he managed to make his way to Niagara.

We stopped at the old Killean School, where Mrs. Walzer taught for a year before leaving the district, and also at the fine home of Mrs. Frank Ferguson, a former member of the Reporter staff. The Fergusons enjoy living out in the country and was surprised to learn that in the nine years that they have been ther, Frank has missed only one day in the winter from being in his classroom at the G.C.I.

At the McCormick home, where Mrs. Walzer is now living, she has a great collection of old books, which were handed down to her, and also a beautiful old statue that she highly prizes.

Road Undermined Near Killean July 19th 1956.

The Killean Station sideroad, which runs north off the Clyde Road, is closed to all traffic and for a good reason. Road builders, in widening and filling in a section of the sideroad a half mile from the Clyde Road ran into a bit of hard luck. A small wooden bridge over a narrow creek collapsed. The roadbed was apparently undermined by water and a long stretch of it took a sudden drop, leaving a long gaping hole. Now the contractor has a rebuilding job to do and trees have been cut down, the trunks dropped into the hole to provide a firm foundation, and tons and tons of fill and big rocks are being hauled to the scene, a powerful bulldozer being utilized to level the material and push it ahead into the gap. Killean Area Native Travelling Scholar
(from the Galt Reporter newspaper for February 5th 1965.)

A native of Puslinch, Killean District, Mrs. Christena Walzer has been a temporary resident of the city (Galt). She is the daughter of pioneer settlers, Mr. and Mrs. Donald McLarty, and is the last survivor of a family of six sons and five daughters. She was a former teacher at the Killean School at the turn of the century, then in Florida, U.S.A. A Puslinch historian and an extensive traveller, Mrs. Walzer is a most interesting conversationalist and possesses a wonderful memory. She has been staying at the Iroquois, on one of her periodic visits. Mrs. Walzer now has no permanent address and is the personification of that expression "wherever I hang my hat is home sweet home to me". She just keeps on travelling, visiting relatives and old friends. She has a son living in Headingly, Manitoba. Mrs. Walzer came east last November to visit with her niece, the late Miss Mary McCormick. The visitor contracted pneumonia and entered the SWMH (South Waterloo Memorial Hospital) for treatment. While hospitalized, her niece died suddenly.

Since her last visit to this district, the old stone Killean School, where she received her elementary education and where she later taught, closed its door to teacher and pupils at the end of the school term last June. Now, the pupils of that district are transported by bus to the Crieff School. The abandoned schoolhouse was then sold, and has been converted and modernized into a family dwelling.

Mrs. Walzer recalled the former Killean School was over 100 years old, and in addition to serving as a place where the children of the farmers learned reading, writing, and arithmetic, it was also used for church services and Sunday School in the early days, also as a place for political meetings, dances, and other worthy community activities.

The old stone house on the original McLarty farm at Killean, in which Mrs. Walzer was born, is now occupied by Gordon Bridgeman, who operates a market garden and attends Galt market.

Just to illustrate what a remarkably active woman Mrs. Walzer is, for her years, she enrolled at Manitoba Teachers' College in Winnipeg for a summer course, in 1963, specializing in bilingualism.

The woman's thirst for knowledge inspired Lillian Gibbons, a feature writer on the Winnipeg Tribune, to pen a three-column story about this remarkable woman, who set an example for the younger generation to obtain all the education that they can when they have the opportunity.

As a result of that article, Mrs. Walzer has been invited by Canadian Broadcasting Corporation officials in Winnipeg to make a broadcast on the subject of "Women First".

While she never engaged in newspaper work, Mrs. Walzer has contributed stories on historical and travel topics, gratuitously, to not only Canadian but also to U.S. newspapers.

A couple of years ago, when living in Weyburn, Saskatchewan, Mrs. Walzer, at the request of Mrs. Isabel Eagleshan, wife of a doctor there, who was writing a book on the history of Weyburn and its people, in commemoration of its 50th jubilee, published by the Weyburn Review, was asked to contribute in view of the fact that her brothers, McLartys, were among early settlers.

In 1901, Nathan McLarty, a brother of Mrs. Walzer, filed on a homestead in the vicinity of Weyburn. He pioneered as early as 1899 in North Dakota. He came from Killean, Wellington County, in Ontario. Later, his brothers, Donald, John Coy, and Norman, and his neighbours, Donald Ferguson and Billy Gilchrist, came to Saskatchewan. Some years later, Bill Gilchrist and John Coy McLarty went back to Ontario, and returned West with their brides, Mary Scott and Anna Joyce. Soon, the children of neighbouring families were of school age, and a school was built. Trustees Billy Gilchrist and John Coy McLarty named it Killean, after their native spot in Ontario.

The original old stone schoolhouse in Ontario still contributes to the education of young Canada. Right across the road from this school is the first home in Canada of Donald McLarty and his wife, the former Ellen Ramsay, a descendant of Sir Alexander Ramsay, first Governor of Montreal and the Earl of Dalhousie.

On this farm, Dugald McLarty, grandfather of Nathan McLarty and five stalwart brothers and five sisters, hid William Lyon McKenzie, ancestor of McKenzie King, in a turnip pit for three days, when he was hunted as a traitor during the 1837 rebellion.

Puslinch Celebrates 120 Years Existence August 25th 1970.

The first settler to register land was an Alexander Wilson who settled Lot One, Front Gore, the farm nearest Galt, and at the junction of counties Waterloo, Wellington, and Wentworth, as well as the meeting point of townships Beverly, North Dumfries, and Puslinch, in 1823. He came across the line from Dickson's settlement of Shade's Mills, but why he came and where or when he went is unrecorded.

Around 1831, the next settlers came into the Killean district from Kintyre, Argyllshire. These people were closely related and with Neil McPhatter as spokesman took up lots on the First Concession. Others in the group were William Blue, John Thompson, Angus McDonald, a Mr. McNeil, Alex McNaughton, Archie McShannock, Malcolm Smith, and Malcolm McPhatter.

Within the next few years, these were joined by old country neighbours, including the Ramsays, McCormicks, McAllisters, Gilchrists, McMillans, Clarks, Stewarts, Sinclairs, Blacks, McKellars, McLartys, Martins, another Smith family, Wilkinsons, and McPhersons.

Another group came from the island of Arran, including McMasters, Curries, Morrisons, Cooks, Milroys, Bones, Shaws, and McGregors.

The Paddocks, Reeves, and Helms were English families who came in about the same time.

The majority of the pioneers came from Killean in Scotland.

The first school in the district opened in the 1840's and the first teacher was Neil Currie. He received permission to teach from a Board of Public Instruction in Toronto. When applying for his certificate, he had to satisfy the examiner on two points, one being that he was a British subject and the other that he could name the members of the Royal family. He is reputed to have made pens with goose quills and ink from boiled soft maple bark mixed with copperas and sugar.

Other teachers before the turn of this century were Miss Black, John McGregor, Alexander McIntyre, Archie McPherson, Alex Gilchrist, Robert Galbraith, James Ramsay, S. Charlton – later Dr. Charlton, of Galt, Miss Kennedy, Miss Janet Gilchrist, Miss Mary Gilchrist, and Walter Laird.

When Alexander McIntyre sat for his teacher's certificate, more questions were asked, one being "When was Scotland conquered?" The fact that he replied "Never!" did not prevent him from getting the desired permit.

Killean never went far commercially. Donald and Lewis Ferguson carried on the store opened by William Nichol. A Post Office operated there until 1913 when rural mail was established. James Johnston had a blacksmith shop west of the store. Puslinch Lake made up for the lack of hotels in the district. At one time, five were in operation.

The first church was made of logs and built around 1840 on Neil McPhatter's farm, Lot 15. Later, the church was moved to Crieff.
